A Message from Town Mayor Cllr Fraser Tinsley

& the members of the Greater Willington Town Council

On 4 May this year there will be elections to form a new Greater Willington Town Council. This is a good time to look back at what the current Town Council has achieved over the past 4 years and look forward to the challenges facing the new incoming Town Council and Greater Willington as a whole.

Working in partnership we have achieved a huge amount which has real benefits for Greater Willington. A new CCTV system has been installed on the Main Street. This will help in the fight against anti-social behaviour and make us all safer. The Town Green playground has been renewed; our Christmas and Halloween events have gone from strength to strength. The South Dene wood has been reopened up and is a real amenity for the area. The North Dene footpaths have been improved. We have introduced a new free Citizens Advice service. We have relocated to the former Market Hotel, which has helped regenerate the Main Street by bringing this building back into active use. We have secured a defibrillator to be installed on the front of the Town

Council office for use in heart attack emergencies. In partnership with Beamish Museum we are embarking on a major new project to celebrate our history which will include subsidised visits to Beamish for residents. We have overseen projects to plant bulbs, tackle dog fouling and improve the overall environment in which we live.

We have continued to support many voluntary organisations in the area. This is an increasingly important role for the Town Council, when support for groups and organisations which help to maintain and foster a sense of community in this area is under pressure. From parent and toddler groups, to groups for pensioners and older people, our sports clubs, churches, allotment groups and environment improvement

groups have all benefitted from Town Council funding.

I am also delighted to say that good financial management by the Town Council means all this has been achieved and we are able to freeze the Town Council element of the Council Tax this year. There will be no increase because we know many people are finding it difficult to make ends meet.

As we move forward there are new challenges that the Town Council and this community must face. Continuing government cuts means that we are going to need to identify new sources of income that can be used to support our area. We are increasingly 'on our own.' Maintaining and growing a sense of community is vitally important as many new people move into this area.



Partnership working with other organisations and County Councillors is increasingly important as we need to make every pound we have work harder.

Finally, I thank everybody in this community for their support over the past 4 years. I thank the Town Council staff, other Town Councillors and fellow County Councillor Olwyn Gunn. I am confident in saying that the Town Council is now in a stronger position to make a real difference in this community than when I took over its leadership 4 years ago. This is important as it will be central to securing a better future for our Town.

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Council Tax Charges – No increase for 2017/18

The Council proposed that there would be no increase in the 2017/18 GWTC Band D Council Tax.

The 0% increase on 2016/17charge will mean that it remains at £52.29 per annum. Most properties in this area are in bands A and B. The rates for various Bands is detailed below.

Band C £46.48 Band B £40.67 Band A £34.86

Greater Willington Town Council's Charges are £20.00 per year less than our neighbouring parishes at Brancepeth and Tow Law and less than a quarter of the cost billed to residents living in Spennymoor, Great Aycliffe or Shildon.

Citizens Advice Outreach at Greater Willington Town Council

In September 2016 we launched a new Citizens Advice service based at GWTC Office on the High St. It is funded jointly by the Town Council and County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley, using their Neighbourhood budgets.

This service can help with many issues including, benefits, debt, relationships, consumer rights and housing.

Since it started in September, there have been over 200 client contacts in the sessions. Of this 57% of issues relate to benefits (mainly Employment Support Allowance and Personal Independence Payment). These include practical help with form filling and appeals against decisions. So far this year the estimated annualised financial outcome for clients is £286,000 (not confirmed as some appeals remain undetermined). This is a truly staggering figure in one small community and a real example of where the Town Council working in partnership with County Councillors are making a real difference to people's lives.

You can access the service at a 'Drop In' on a Monday or a Wednesday between 10am and 1pm. Tuesday's session is by appointment only. Appointments can be made via the Advice Line on 03444 111 444 Monday to Friday 10am until 4pm. You must make your own appointment. We are sorry but the Town Council cannot make appointments for you.

The service has proved popular and appears to be supporting residents through their individual circumstances. The Town Council is committed to continuing to provide towards the costs of Citizens Advice staff and services in 2017.

Greater Willington Town Council @ The Market



It is approaching a year since the move to the new Council Office. Town Councillors and staff are now all based @ The Market they can be contacted on the telephone numbers listed in this Newsletter.

With the improved meeting facilities, the Town Council meets the first Wednesday of each month at 6.30 pm. There is a recess each August.

Members of the public are welcome to observe the conduct of Council Business. Residents who wish to address the meeting may do so during the Public Participation Agenda Item. Please contact the Town Clerk no later than 12 noon on the day of the meeting so that you can be added to the Agenda to speak.

Dog Bags are still on sale for parishioner's pooches at a discounted rate of 50 pence a pack. Please continue to support us in our efforts to combat Dog Fouling by encouraging family members to clean up.

Photocopying services are also available at 15 pence per side for black and white.

Unfortunately due to security considerations we do not have public access to Fax or IT equipment and would encourage the use of the Library facilities.

Big thanks to Stephen Pardew and Kenny Tutty for doing a great job with the Office Window Boxes, which has improved the front of the

Pat Glass MP Caseworker can also be found here on the first Tuesday of the month. Meetings with community groups have been held throughout the year to develop local solutions. We are pleased to report that the Oakenshaw Neighbourhood Plan group have been meeting and making progress.

Public meetings are organised when necessary to listen to residents views e.g. around Planning issues.

The new accommodation has played host to number of successful community events including a Official Opening Day on the 8th July 2016, a Let Them Eat Cake Day, the Clerks fundraiser for McMillan Cancer Care, a Children's Halloween Pumpkin Carving afternoon and Fancy Dress Party and the Christmas Illuminations.

New Close Circuit Television (CCTV)

Safety on the High Street and combating all aspect of anti social behaviour is important for many of our residents.

The Town Council has listened to your views and taken out a contract to install new CCTV equipment.

There will be five strategically placed cameras in operation, with the 24 hour monitoring being staffed by Durham County Council at the Chilton debot. There is a direct link to Durham Constabulary Officers who can intercept or follow up on any crime or antisocial behaviour incident that is detected.

Funding for the scheme is provided by the Town Council, Ron Hogg, County Durham Police, Crime and Victim Commissioner, the Area Action Partnership and your County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley. Partnership working at its best.



Willington Foodbank



Two areas of Greater Willington are defined as being in the 10% most deprived in the country (2015).

It's a sad reality, but an increasing number of people in our community need to access the Foodbank in order to feed themselves and their family. There has been a notable increase in demand in recent weeks and reasons for needing to access include changes (delays) to benefits

payments, zero-hours contracts and relationship breakdown. Worryingly there are increasing numbers of older persons aged from 50-65 accessing the Foodbank who have never experience poverty in the past.

The foodbank operates from the Willington Community Action Centre next to the Town Council Offices on the High Street. It is open on a Tuesday from 1pm to 3pm. Clients using the foodbank require a referral

note to get food from doctors, schools, Job Centre Plus etc.

Donations of food and toiletries are urgently needed. These can be left at the Town Council Office. Please help if you can.

The foodbank are also seeking volunteers to help with distribution. Anybody with a few hours of time to spare is most welcome. There is a particular need for people with counselling or social work experience.



New 20mph Zones for our Schools

Durham County Council are establishing two 20mph Zones in our area that will operate during school opening and closing times.

These are proven to improve safety for children and parents and will be located on the Main Street near to Willington Primary School and Our Lady & St Thomas R.C. Primary School.

We are working with County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley to provide an additional 20mph Zone on Hunwick Lane next to Sunnybrow Primary. These are programmed to be in place by the end of 2018.

New Willington Town Green Play Equipment



The old play equipment on the Town Green was worn out and has been removed and replaced with new surfacing and play kit.

Gatheris Castle includes eleven new play features; a high steel slide, a trapeze crossing, 3 curved castle towers, castle theme walls, inclined rope bridge, a fireman's

pole and 2 twisted ladders

More fun can be had on the Crazy Twister, the Buddy Board, the Swirl Inclusive Roundabout and the Viking Swings. Speed round the Fitness Trail then enjoy Leaf Hopscotch, Snakes and Ladders and Noughts and Crosses.

The scheme has been financed by the

Town Council, your County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley's Neighbourhood Budget and s106 Housing Development funds.

We hope the eleven years and under get great use out of it over the summer months.

A New Playground for Sunnybrow

County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley have funded a new playground for Sunnybrow.

It will redevelop the existing playground opposite Huntsgarth,

which everybody agreed needed improvement.

Children and parents of Sunnybrow asked for a new playground to match the one provided on Willington Town Green. Even better news is that children from Sunnybrow Primary School helped with the design. All being well, it will open this April in time for the Easter holidays.

That's two new playgrounds in two years. Not bad going!





Remembrance Sunday

Remembrance Sunday is an important day in our Town's calendar when we gather at the War Memorial to remember our war dead

The occasion has grown in recent years and we have included events to commemorate 100 years since the start of the Great War and the Battle of the Somme.

On Sunday 6th November 2016 the Town Council hosted the Remembrance Sunday service at the War Memorial and the Parade to St Stephens Church.

The Services were led by Reverend David Spokes and our grateful thanks are extended to Marine Andrew Richardson 1AGRM who performed the Master of Ceremonies Role.

Aycliffe and Brancepeth Brass Band once again provided the musical accompaniment.

The Council supported the Royal British Legion Wreath distribution and the Poppy Collection Boxes from the Council Office. Our thanks are extended to Pam Rossell, Honorary Poppy Organiser and Lillian Bennett gave the boxes out to local collection points.

War Memorial Cross

Councillor Carr and Councillor Cogdon have been liaising with Durham County Council and Historic England and are pleased to announce that the Willington, Oakenshaw and Page Bank War Memorial at Low Willington has been awarded Listed Building status Grade II.

Memory of Willington War Hero Comes Home







In April 2018, Willington will receive one of seven Victoria Cross Commemorative Stones to be presented to communities in County Durham.

This commemorates 100 years since events on the night of 27-28 April 1918. During a raid on German trenches at Gavrelle, near Arras, patrol led by Willington born Lieutenant George Burdon McKean was pinned down by intense machine gun fire and hand grenades thrown from a strongly-defended German position. George McKean rushed the barbed wire barricade and, armed only with his revolver, leapt over the top and fought with two German defenders before killing them both. The remainder of the Canadian patrol then joined McKean as he cleared the trench and dug-outs with Mills bombs, killing or taking prisoner several German soldiers.

We will be working with Durham County Council on a project to install the stone and commemorate this important event in the history of our Town.

The Story of Our Town

This is a new project being developed to explore and record one hundred years of history in Willington and will look back at life in the town in 1918

The project aims to research the town's social, military and industrial history and produce an Exhibition. We would like to involve local families and Clubs in the Exhibition.

The Story will focus on 1918 and include the development of

a new civic space dedicated to George Burdon McKean from Willington who was awarded the Victoria Cross and became one of the most decorated surviving soldiers in British/ Empire forces history.

Heritage Lottery Funding is being applied for and first meetings have been held. Project partners include Durham County Council, Beamish Living Museum, Durham Miners Association, Durham County Records Office, Veterans Affairs Canada, Durham Light Infantry Museum and local businesses.

As well as the written word, we intend to use a range of mediums to tell our Story including performance art, re-enactment, music, poetry and media. If you have time to spare to help us in any aspect of the project or if you would like to be trained in research skills, please let us know that you would like to join us in this very exciting project.

The Miners Brazier Beacon



The Miners Memorial Beacon has been lit on two occasions since it was commissioned last year.

The Town Council organised ceremonies to commemorate those who lost their lives in the Brancepeth Colliery Pit Disaster held on the 13th April 2017.

We then joined in the national event to light beacons throughout the

Country in honour of Her Royal Highness Queen Elizabeth's 90th Birthday on the 21st April 2016.

Our thanks are extended to all residents who attended.

The Brazier will again be lit this year on Thursday 13th April at 8pm (sunset) to commemorate the disaster. Residents are invited to attend to hear the reading of names of those who died in the disaster.



High St Project

We have been working on a project to look at the Main Street in Willington which everybody realises is struggling.

There are many reasons for this including changing shopping and work patterns and increased internet shopping.

Local resident and student at Newcastle University James Vasey volunteered and surveyed the Main Street for us. We still have butchers, green grocers, a post office and a number of other specialist retails in areas including vacuum cleaner sales and repair, discount shops, pet shop, newsagents, cafes, convenience stores, hairdressers and take-a-ways. We have relaxed parking time restrictions on the Main Street and with County Councillors have supported a general ongoing environmental improvement scheme for the area.



Many thanks to James Vasey for his help with this project. Please use our local shops if you can. We will continue to look at ways at improving the Main Street but we need everybody to play their part no matter how small.

Durham Western Relief Road

GWTC are working to support the Durham Western Relief Road proposals.

This is a new road that will run from Stonebridge to Snipely Roundabout, Durham and will make a huge difference reducing traffic congestion on the A690 approaching Neville's Cross, which as many of us in this area know, is terribly congested at peak times.

We have lobbied the County Council who are preparing a new County Durham Plan to include the Western Relief Road as critical new infrastructure. It is a major investment costing in the region of £30 million and subject to support from government could be completed in 5-6 years.

It will dramatically reducing travel times from this area to Durham and Tyne and Wear at peak times and improve the quality of life for the many commuters from this area.



High Speed Fibre Broadband comes to Greater Willington

Greater Willington now benefits from High Speed Fibre Broadband.

This has been made possible by Digital Durham at Durham County Council working with Openreach to endure that we get the speeds necessary to access the internet at the speeds required for business and entertainment today.

A Heart Defibrillator for Willington

Councillor Henfrey has led the charge to provide a Heartstart Defibrillator and Outdoor Cabinet for emergency first aid on the High Street. It will be in place in coming weeks.

In the hopefully unlikely event that you will be called on to use it simply telephone 999 and you will be given the code to open the cabinet.

The equipment has clear diagrams on how to use it and once switched on will tell you what to do. The machine is very safe and will not shock a patient who is still conscious.

Please make yourself familiar with where the Defibrillator is located on the outside of the Town Council Office your quick thinking could save someone's life.

The Council provided a rest stop and refreshments for the groups march through Willington.


Willington A.F.C.

Allotments

If you love your wellies then an Allotment Garden could be just the thing for you.

As a Town Council we are responsible for providing allotment gardens to households in our Parish.

In order to provide uniformity across the County. Big changes are afoot as we review our allotment management procedures and policies to mirror those of Durham County Council and introduce co workers as opposed to joint tenants

The basic principles of existing letting agreements will remain in place, namely;

- Allotments will be let from the Council Waiting List.
- One allotment garden per household to feed his or her family for parish residents.
- A twelve month unsecured tenancy.

Applications from residents who have been previously been instructed to vacate the garden for whatever reason will not be accepted.

Allotment tenants must sign to agree that;

- Over 50% of the garden will be cultivated.
- They will not cause nuisance or annoyance to any other occupier or obstruct any path set out for the use of the occupiers.
- They will not shall sublet or part with possession of any part of the allotment garden.
- Asbestos or tyres or non gardening items shall not be brought on to the site.

Applications for the erection of any building suitable for keeping hens or rabbits, or a fence will be made in writing and no building work will be undertaken without written consent.

The allotment or its water supply will not be used from which to operate a business or to store business materials.

In order to maintain good sites we will be approaching those tenants who feel that the rules don't apply to them and be vigilant about eligibility to a further twelve month tenancy.



If you fancy enjoying the organic fruits of your labour why not ask us for an allotment garden application form or download one from the website.

- Willington Football Club were successful in drawing down £500 for facilities and pitch maintenance.




Civic Fund Awards
