Gather at the War Memorial

Commemoration for the VC Stone

WW1 Experience at The Open Door Church



LIEUTENANT GEORGE MCKEAN QUEBEC REGIMENT 27TH - 28TH APRIL 1918

Work is nearing completion to provide a memorial to Capt. George Burdon McKean VC MM MC. George was born in Willington and went on to become one of the most decorated men in British / Empire forces history.

We have been awarded a commemorative stone by the government to mark 100 years since the action in France took place for which George was awarded his Victoria Cross. The Town Council has been working with County Councillors, other groups and individuals on a project to provide a truly fitting memorial for George, a son of Willington who went on to fight in the Canadian Army, and which we should be truly proud.

George Burdon McKean is a hero in Canada. He has a mountain named after him in Alberta and the main square in the town in France where the action took place is named in his honour. We are working with local artist Graham Hopper and children from Parkside Academy to provide a landmark that will last for another 100 years. We have been awarded Heritage Lottery Funding and this together with Councillor Neighbourhood Budgets and Town Council funding will make this happen.

The memorial includes the Victoria Cross commemorative stone, a plaque about his story and a major new art work. It includes a maple leaf to represent Canada, poppies to remember fallen British and Empire forces and blue cornflowers (the French flower of remembrance). There will also be new flag poles to display British, Canadian and French flags at the service.

The main ceremony to install the memorial will take place on 28th April 2018. We hope you will join us at 10.40 am at the War Memorial to pay tribute to local WW1 soldiers and then follow the parade from the War Memorial to the Library.

We are delighted to host Lieutenant Colonel John Shone, Commanding Officer of the Royal Montreal Regiment (RMR) who has accepted our invitation to attend the event and is traveling from Canada. Everybody is welcome - so please do come out and make this a very special day in the history of our town.

About Capt. George Burdon McKean VC MM MC

George Burdon McKean was born in Willington, England on 4 July 1888. Son of James McKean, who was a furniture broker, and Jane Ann (nee Henderson). Orphaned at a young age, he lived with his sister in Bishop Auckland where he became an apprentice cabinetmaker with Messrs T Thompson, Newgate Street.

He emigrated to Canada in 1902, settling in Edmonton working on a cattle ranch and later on his brothers farm. When the First World War broke out, he was 5' 6" tall and weighed only nine stone. He was rejected three times but on 23 January 1915 he enlisted as a private soldier in the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

After completing his training, Private McKean arrived back in Britain in April 1916 and joined the 14th Infantry Battalion (Royal Montreal Regiment) on the Western front in June 1916.

In the course of his military service, he received the Military Medal, and, after he was commissioned as an officer, the Military Cross.

Lieutenant McKean earned the Victoria Cross while serving with the 14th Infantry Battalion near Gavrelle in France on 27 and 28 April 1918. McKean was leading a party of scouts against a German trench that was being staunchly defended by troops using rifles and hand grenades. When his men hesitated, he ran forward alone and threw himself head first into the trench, killing two of the enemy with his revolver. Inspired by Lieutenant McKean's action. his men advanced and swept the German defenders aside, capturing both the trench and its remaining occupants.

He was one of only a handful of people who received all three medals.

In July 1919 McKean retired from the Canadian Army with rank of Captain and he settled in Brighton where he married Constance Hilton. He had one daughter.

McKean was a published author. He wrote Scouting Thrills, The Memoirs of a Scout Officer in the Great War.

In memory of McKean his Victoria Cross is stored at the Canadian War Museum, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada.

The Church Square of Cagnicourt, France was renamed 'La Place Du George Burdon McKean'.

A mountain in the Victoria Cross Ranges, Canada, is named in his honour.

His name is also present on the memorial wall located in Convocation Hall at the University of Alberta, where he had enrolled on an arts course which was interrupted by the outbreak of WW1.

He survived the war but was fatally wounded and killed in a horrific accident at a saw mill on 28 November 1926.

Victoria Cross citation for Lieutenant George Burdon McKean, London Gazette, 28 June 1918

"For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches.

Lt. McKean's party, which was operating on the right flank, was held up at a block in the communication trench by most intense fire from hand grenades and machine guns. This block, which was too close to our trenches to have been engaged by the preliminary bombardment, was well protected by wire and covered by a well protected machine gun 30 yards behind it. Realising that if this block were not destroyed, the success of the whole operation might be marred, he ran into the open to the right flank of the block, and with utter disregard of danger, leaper over the block head first on top of the enemy. Whilst lying on the ground on top of one of the enemy, another rushed at him with fixed bayonet; Lt. McKean shot him through the body and then shot the enemy

underneath him, who was struggling violently. This very gallant action enabled the position to be captured. Lt. McKean's supply of bombs ran out at this time. and he sent back to our front line for a fresh supply. Whilst waiting for them he engaged the enemy singlehanded.

When the bombs arrived, he fearlessly rushed the second block, killing two of the enemy, capturing four others and drove the remaining garrison, including a hostile machine-gun section, into a dug-out. The dug-out, with its occupants and machine gun, was destroyed.

This officer's splendid bravery and dash undoubtedly saved many lives, for had not this position been captured, the whole of the raiding party would have been exposed to dangerous enfilading fire during the withdrawal. His leadership at all times has been beyond praise.'

The Battles Over - A Nations Tribute

On the 3rd August 1914, Britain's Foreign Minister Sir Edwin Grey, was looking out of his office window. It was dusk and gas lights were being lit along London's Mall, leading to Buckingham Palace when he remarked to his friend, 'The lamps are going out all over Europe; we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime' Our country was about to be plunged into the darkness of the First World War and it would be four long years before Britain and Europe would again experience the light of peace.

Ringing out for Peace

In memory of the millions that either died on the battlefield during dreadful conditions or returned home terribly wounded. The churches in our parish will be taking part in the Ringing for Peace tribute.

Council Tax Charges 2018/19

Following the freeze in the Town Councils tax charge last year and this year's drop in the local council tax reduction scheme.

The council proposed at its January meeting that there would be a increase in this year's Town Council element of Council Tax.

The increase will mean that the Band D charge is $\pounds 57.20$ per year, 2018/19. This is $\pounds 4.91$ more than last year for Band D properties.

Most people in the parish live in a Band A home. There are 2,274 properties in Band A and 359 in Band D The Town Council charge per year is listed below.

Finishing touches are being put in place for two new 20mph Zones in Willington. Working with Durham County Council two 20mph Zones will be introduced south of Commercial St and at Our Lady and St Thomas R.C Primary School.

The Zones are intended to improve safety for children, parents and neighbouring residents.

The first covers the area south of Commercial St as far as Sunnybrow.It means that Parkside Academy, Willington Primary School and St Stephens Primary School will all benefit from 20mph Zones outside of their premises, not to mention over 600 houses in Hall Lane and the Armstrong Drive areas.

The second is located on the High Street in the vicinity of Our Lady and St Thomas R.C Primary School.

Keeping our Schools & Communities Safe from Speeding

These measures are proven to improve safety for children which is our top priority.

Part of the project will be traffic calming measures on Chester Drive which are being funded by the Town Council and County Councillors Olwyn Gunn and Fraser Tinsley. We are working with County Councillors to provide an additional 20mph Zone on Hunwick Lane next to Sunnybrow Primary.

The works are programmed to be in place by the end of 2018.

The Sunnybrow Heart Defibrillator

The Friends of Sunnybrow have worked extremely hard to raise £1200 to buy a defibrillator and cabinet. They approached the Town Council to purchase the equipment and provide the additional funds.

As the council was happy to provide the additional funds, the equipment is now outside Sunnybrow School and available for emergency first aid. The town council will own and insure the equipment and restock the products as required. The School will maintain and carry out the safety inspections on behalf of the council.

In the hopefully unlikely event that you will be called on to use it telephone 999 and you will be given the code to open the cabinet.

The equipment has clear diagrams on how to use it and once switched on will tell you what to do. The machine is very safe and will not shock a patient who is still conscious.

Please make yourself familiar with where the defibrillator is located on the outside of Sunnybrow School.

Other defibrillators are available on the front of the Town Council office in the High Street and in Oakenshaw.

Allotment Rents

All tenants should have received their invoices for the allotment season

2018-2019. Rents are due on or before the 1st April 2018. Failure to pay by this date could result in your tenancy agreement being revoked and the plot being offered to the next person on the waiting list.

Allotment rents were frozen last year 2017-2018. This new season 2018-2019 includes an increase of 3% to cover increased utilities and maintenance costs. An increase for 2019-20 is not planned.

Allotment Policy

Further to the revised Lettings Policy that was circulated last year for your comments these have now been incorporated into the 2018-19 Policy. This mirrors that used by Durham County Council to provide consistency in allotment management.

· Please note that we no longer accept joint tenancies within our parish but we can offer co-worker agreements.

- · By law we are only obliged to offer one garden per household ie enough to feed one household.
- We still let the plot via a twelve month unsecured tenancy.
- · Applications from residents who have been previously been instructed to vacate the garden for whatever reason will not be accepted.
- We have provided more robust guidelines on the keeping of poultry following recent bird health scares.
- We still operate a no cockerel rule.
- We still operate an over 50% cultivation rule for you to keep a 50% rent discount
- Sub letting will not be tolerated

Respect Your Allotment Boundaries

Please keep your fence line in a neat and tidy condition.

Under no circumstances can you throw rubbish over the fence into the adjoining plots or surrounding fields. This causes complaints to the council from private land owners and is dangerous to the landowners domestic pets and livestock.

Oakenshaw Community Orchard Garden





The Community Orchard Garden was created for the benefit of both the community and local wildlife. It is managed and maintained by a small group of villagers under control of the Oakenshaw Community Association with help from village volunteers.

Greater Willington Town Council provided the allotment to transform into an orchard garden. It has been designed to be wheelchair friendly and easily accessible to all, offering a place of recreation and contemplation, and providing opportunities for involvement in gardening and other group activities.

The garden has progressed over the past few years from an empty plot. The main design with a series of areas for different planting schemes has now been established. Fruit trees and bushes have been planted, and as they develop their harvest can be shared by the village. All-weather paths have been created together with a shelter and seating, and a raised bed has been built to encourage the involvement of less mobile gardeners. The orchard garden has easy access from the road. Landscaping and building work was undertaken by Treetops Garden and Fencing Construction.

In 2017, following an initial Open Day to introduce the Orchard Garden to the community, it successfully hosted two further village events, a Halloween gathering and a Christmas Tree lights and decoration event. All events were very well attended and it is hoped to add more in the future.

Northern Heartlands



OUR PAST OUR FUTURE OUR HOME

Northern Heartland's mission is to deliver cultural activities that transform people's understanding of the heritage, landscapes and places they live in, building their confidence and ability to influence policy and decisionmaking.

Northern Heartlands is one of sixteen Great Place Schemes in the UK funded by Heritage Lottery Fund and Arts Council England. They are using a 'cultural landscape' approach, recognising that landscape and places are shaped by what has happened in the past, what is happening now and what may happen in the future. Our landscapes tell an ever-changing story. Our Great Place is in County Durham and includes the catchment of two rivers - the Tees and the Wear extending from their sources in the North Pennines to the lowland arc through which they flow. The area includes the market towns of Barnard Castle, Bishop Auckland, Shildon, Crook, Tow Law and Willington and the communities of part of the former Durham coalfield, together with the isolated hill farms and villages of the rural upper Dales.
